Another reason is that, Taiwan is much closer to Hong Kong, it is easier and cheaper to buy flight tickets to return home if I get serious homesick. Even though, I am a quite independent person, I can handle myself well, I still feel very hard to get used to my college life in Tainan especially the first semester. I remembered that the first mid-term exam, I was really really nervous because I already graduated from high school for almost ten years, I didn't take any exams for ten years! I have no idea how to prepare for it and worrying about my results. I spent most of the time in the library, just took a short lunch break during the mid-term week. No friends, no entertainment, only stay with my books for two weeks. All the pressure for study is raised by myself not from others. My family and my friends fully support me to come here to do what I really want to do, I don't want to let them down and disappointing them. I want to show them how I take my decision seriously and not just come for "travelling". I am not decided to be the top one, but I promise them and myself, try my best to that.
